CLUB NUMBERS ...

As from the 1st of October 1976, if you require a Club Number for a motorcycle you must submit to the Records Officer, Mr. Len Mahar, two photographs right and left side, of your machine and a properly filled in form on the machine's specifications. These will be submitted to the committee who will decide whether your machine is sufficiently restored to warrant the issuing of a number. Once you have your number you can lose it in two

1) If you sell your machine it is required that you remove

the Club Number before doing so.

2) If you become unfinancial or resign you automatically

forfeit your number.

The Committee has made these provisions to avoid the issuing of numbers to machines which will probably never see the light of day. This is what has happened in the past resulting in some Club numbers being attached to rusty old frames hanging on shed walls. REMEMBER! No Club Number until you submit photographs and specifications to the Committee. DON'T leave it to the last meeting before a Run and ask for a last minute reprieve. Get in EARLY

PROCEDURE FOR OBTAINING A CLUB NUMBER FOR YOUR MACHINE.

Firstly, procure from Len Mahar, our Club Registrar, a form. The form asks for information on your machine such as Cubic capacity, year of manufacture, state of paintwork etc. when you got it, what you have done to it since, a brief history of the machine etc.

This form must be filled in to the best of your knowledge and returned to Lendong with a right and left hand side photograph of the machine. This will be submitted to the committee who

will pass juggement on it and issue a number for it.

Until you have this number you cannot enter into any of the Club Runs.

Please, don't ask Clem Evans to enter you in a Run unless you have a number. He has to refuse. Len Mahar is the person to see. The photographs are to convince the committee that the machine is restored to a sufficient standard to make it roadworthy.

Reference—Smoke Signal August 1976 and 1977 regarding Members need to apply for a Club number to be attached to your machine before you can enter club rides and events.

& I was barred from competition riding except in 1936. That
year I rode passenger for Ron Badger in the Centenary
Grand Prix at VictorHarbor. We won on a Square 4 Ariel.

Knowing how I missed out I have given our son Steve

every chance to enjoy the sport.

My mobile Veteran and Vintage bikes are the 1910 Precision, 1927 Ariel Outfit; Post Vintage - the eccentric wheeled Bronce 250 and of course S.A.1. I have the makings of a 1905 Clipper, 1910 Ariel, 1928 Ariel and of course the old Penny Farthing.

The MCC of S.A. first organised the Blood Bank in 1935, so I joined up and still give; so at 148 pints I am the State's top donor. Work it out for yourself how much free beer I have enjoyed. I can make better blood than beer

and will swap blood for beer any day.

GIRL MOTOR CYCLIST

First Outing Tomorrow

About the General Post Office at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning an air of gaiety should prevail, for that time marks the beginning of the first excursion of the only women's motor cycle club in South Australia. Joan Carter (captain) and Mrs. Bob Medwell (secretary) are enthusiastic about its success.

"About 14 or 15 club members will visit Mylor," said Mrs. Medwell this week. "These girls will ride motor cycles, and a corresponding number of men cyclists will accompany us. Most of the girls are all-round sports, and are fond of swimming. We have therefore decided to spend the day at Silver Lake, leaving there at 5 o'clock in the afternoon."

For Mrs. Medwell the day should have more than the average enjoyment, for cycling and swimming are her favorite sports, although horseriding took up a good deal of her time in Melbourne, her home city. There she rode in all classes of events at the Royal Show annually

Mechanical Knowledge Needed

Since her arrival in Adelaide 18 months ago, she has had to omit riding from her sports, although she still owns a horse in Melbourne. However, as secretary of the motor cycle and the Gilberton Swimming Clubs she has more than enough to occupy her time, particularly as she is interested in the mechanical side of motoring.

"I think every woman should be able to do everything necessary to her bike," she says, "and to be prepared for accidents. At the first meeting of the club on Wednesday night I suggested that we should learn first aid, to enable us competently to relieve sufferers in any accident that might occur.

"The social side of the club must not be neglected either, and I shall suggest at our next meeting that we elect a dance committee. We might thus be able to raise funds for the club, and it would mean that members will be in touch with each other when weather is not suitable for cycling."

Pace Set by Captain

Joan Carter has time for no other sport than cycling.

Joan Carter has time for no other sport than cycling.

"I have been interested in it for years," she declares. "On one occasion I was the only girl member of the Indian and B.S.A. Club, and I accompanied the men on their outings. However, it was decided to exclude women from the club after June last, so for the past six months I have been concentrating on forming a club for girls.

"One point that I should like to impress is that the pace of a ride must be set by the captain, and there will be a fine imposed upon anyone passing her, for the captain is responsible for the whole club should an excess of speed limit be reported.

"Not every girl who has joined our club has a cycle, but it is the ambition of every member soon to have one. It has been suggested that we should have a trained mechanic teach us technical points that may be helpful in case of breakdowns on the road."



Foster Wins State 100-Mile Title

Between 4,000 and 5,000 people visited Sellick's Beach today to witness the M.C.C speed trials. Th beach was in fair condition and fast times were recorded.

recorded.

There was a big field in the four-mile novice solo handicap, which was won by R. B. Hector (3½ Norton) from L. Beck (Twin Royal Enfield), with R. Acfield (3½ A.J.S.) third. The winner's time was 3.17 2-5 min.

In taking the two miles M.C.C. solo championship, J. Cantlon attained a speed of nearly 80 m.p.h. and almost approached A. J. Moyle's 1928 record. Cantlon, who rode a 3½ Norton, defeated H. Butler (3½ Rudge) in a field of six

of six.

Hector scored his second success by winning the 12-mile solo handicap over a four-mile lap course. His time for the distance was 9.55 3-5 min. C. L. Hawkes (3½ A.J.S.) was second and J. Brown (2¾ Velocette) third. The winner's average speed was 72 m.p.h. Twenty speedmen contested the title of South Australian 100 miles solo champion. The race was won by C. R. Foster (Norton). L. B eck (twin Royal Enfield) led for a number of laps, but engine trouble caused him to retire.

Foster and Hawkes (A.J.S.) were in front for several laps, then Brown (Velocette) who had been lapping wheel to wheel with Foster took second position. These two gave a spectacular exhibition of speeding down the four-mile course. At 76 miles Foster was in the lead with Brown still holding him, but a lap behind.

behind.

Foster maintained his lead, and finishing with a burst of speed of nearly 100 m.p.h. won from Brown by more than a lap. Fredericks (Rudge) was a lap away third.

Foster's time was 1 hr. 22 mins. 13 4/5 secs. His average speed was 73 m.p.h.

Girls Vacate The Motor Cycling Field

RIDING CLOTHES HARDLY CORRECT FOR PAYING CALLS

One Still Shops on Bike

ODD how fads come and go! few years ago we became quite accustomed to the sight of women speeding down King William street on motor bikes and now, unobtrusively, the fad has died out again.

Out of the 30 or 40 women who bought motor bikes and enthusiastically used them some four years ago

ally used them some four years ago as the most progressive mode of traas the most progressive mode of travel for women, there are only one or two women motor cyclists left. You may see one of them on her bike in town several times a week, looking trim and workmanlike in riding breeches or flannels.

She is Miss Jean

Miss Carter

She is Miss Joan Carter, through whose enthusiasm the Adelaide Ladies' Motor Cycle Club was formed in 1929, and who still thinks that riding a motor bike is the one and only sport, although the other members of the club have long since sold their bikes and declared the fashion finished.

Miss Carter lives at Glenelg, and it is seldom that she uses trams or travels in a motor car. She has been

riding a motor bike for eight years-in which time she has had three machines.

Motor Bike Shopping

She does at least 100 miles each week on short journeys on "Elizabeth," as she dubs her boke, and when she goes into the country has done as much as 250 miles in one day as calmly as another woman would travel in a tramcar. Since skirts are a nuisance on a bike which travels on average between 35 and 40 miles an hour, this woman rider always wears breeches.

"When I go shopping in town I wear breeches just the same," she said. "People probably stare, but I don't notice it. We got quite accustomed to comments and criticism when bikes first came in—and what does it matter, anyhow?"

she does her own repairs to her bike, and fixes up her tyres, and except for a few spills in motor bike trials has never had an accident. On one occasion, when her bike caught alight in a trial, she switched off the petrol, and stood calmly holding the machine until the flames died down, rather than lay it down on the swampy ground.

Cup Donated

The affairs of the Adelaide Ladies' Motor Cycle Club, of which Miss Carter was the one and only captain, were wound up not long ago, when cycling for women began to go into a decline and the members decided they no longer wanted to keep up their riding. Before that the club had flourished exceedingly, and its finances were so healthy that there was money at the finish to be disposed of.

So the women have donated a trophy to the Motor Cycling Club of South Australia, for which the men members will compete this year. It will be awarded to the rider gaining the most points, in open competition.

the most points, in open competition.

"It must have been about June in 1929 when the motor bicycle craze for women set in," Miss Etta Thomas, erstwhile secretary of the Ladies Club, and winner of two cups, recalled. "And the club came into being in October with about 30 riding members. We were all keen, but knew it wasn't a sport that would last.

"We always had a crowd at our trials. One of the most entertaining was a contest we had on a hill behind the Presbyterian Girls' College at Glen Osmond when riders had to climb a hill, first as fast as they could, and then at their lowest speed.

could, and then at their lowest speed.

"Some of our outstanding riders were Miss Joan Carter, who was our first and only captain, Mrs. N. Hill, Miss M. Story, and Miss Jean Strang. After a while most of our riders came to the conclusion that motor bike riding for women was not without its drawbacks. For one thing, it was hard to keep clean, and clothes, if right for riding a bike, were hardly correct for shopping or paying calls at the end of the journey. So the sport has died."



HIGH SPEEDS were registered by competitors in the annual speed meeting conducted by the Motor Cycle Club of South Australia at Sellick's Beach yesterday. The principal race—the Charles Moyle 100 miles solo handicap—was won by Clem Foster, in 1 hour 22 min. 13 4-5 sec. J. Brown, who finished second, is seen leading Foster, but at that stage there were still several laps to go.

By the early 'thirties, women were steadily entering into every field of sport. One was riding motorcycles, resulting in the formation of The Ladies Motorcycle Club of South Australia. The Register and News newspapers of the day reported during an interview with Mrs Bob Medwell, _'Let us out show the men', as they thought it was about time they, the girls, take the men to task and enjoy the outdoor pastimes of motorcycle riding and competing against the men.

The Advertiser stated, "Previously the girls have been content to ride with the men as 'guests' but their numbers have increased so rapidly within the last few months they feel they are strong enough body to be able to launch out into a club for themselves". The 'News' newspaper reported the club was formed on 5th February 1930 at Bob Medwell's showrooms at 153 The Parade Norwood, which later become their head-quarters. Mr Bob Medwell was a well-known rider competing at Wayville and Camden Park, where he competed against Harry Butler the famed World War I fighter pilot. At the inaugural meeting they decided to name the club as The South Australian Ladies Motorcycling Club. First elections showed Mrs Fay Taylour to be patron, Mr B. Medwell as President, Mrs Bob Medwell the Chairwomen and General Secretary, Miss Joan Carter of Bishop Place, Kensington Captain and Competition Secretary, Miss Jean Strang Vice Captain, M. Raynor as Marshal, M. Hanson treasurer and assistant secretary and E. Thomas as social secretary. The annual subscription fee was five shillings.

The inaugural meeting, 24 ladies became immediate members and the club soon grew to about 50 members. Any make of motorcycle could be used and members were allowed to ride solo, pillion or sidecar. Runs were to held on Sundays with the ride distance to be decided at each meeting which were held every other Wednesday at Medwell's rooms. It was hoped that they complete in hill climbs and reliability trials at first then progress to races and speedway along with social gatherings. The organisation hoped to become affiliated with The Motorcycle Club of South Australia.

The women adopted a Guernsey as a uniform of red and white blazer jackets and red berets. The adopted Guernseys would have two stripes of half an inch thickness at the collar, cuff and bottom to give a picturesque effect to their costumes. They will not wear riding breeches but wear cream silk frocks. The club flag will be red with a white monogram and will be carried by the Club Captain. The Register newspaper said 'club members will provide a picturesque addition to the traffic' given their uniform. During this time, Den Faulkner of Lenroc Ltd (motorcycle dealers) arranged training for the girls purchasing motorcycles on how to ride and understand their motorcycles, and Hubbard's Ltd, another dealer, offered practical help to the ladies and supplied trophies and prizes to the club.

Whilst waiting for a reply from the Motorcycle Club of South Australia, 'Mrs Bob Medwell stated to the Register newspaper, "We want to compete against the men in all their contests, and there is no reason why we should not prove equal to them. Why, only a couple of weeks ago Jean Strang, one of our members came second in a flag and barrel race against men contestants. We have been formed only a few weeks". At the first meeting, the ladies decided one club run was to Silver Lake, Mylor, leaving the GPO at 10am. The News and Register newspapers reported on Sunday's ride as, "The loud splattering roar of a dozen or so motorcycles disturbed the Sunday morning peace of the city yesterday as one after another a number of young girl cyclist arrived at the GPO to take part in the first official run of the Women's Motorcycle Club. With their light silk frocks and gay berets, the girls looked anything but the capable cyclist they proved to be.

After a briefing by Club Captain Miss Joan Carter the girls started their bikes and rode off, roaring through the hills, villages (at a moderate pace or 20mph to 25mph) where locals came out to see young bare armed ladies and vivid capped ladies ride pass. Some rode their own motorcycles others on borrowed machines or rode pillion. By the time they reached Mylor Lake the temperature had reached 112 degrees so the girls hurried into gay bathing suits to the fresh water. Unfortunately Miss Ivy Cochran aged 19 years a waitress was involved in an accident in the city sustained a sprained wrist and abrasions. Joan Carter was one of the oldest members of the club and rode her 2 1/4hp AJS which she rode daily to her work and weekend leading club events. Mrs Robert Medwell a recent recruit to motorcycling now owned a 2 3/4hp James. The ladies were keen to enjoy their newly acquired motorcycles and become capable riders both socially and at speed, and to "out show the men".

The second meeting was held on 19th February 1930 where Mrs Frieda Medwell resigned as President and Miss J. Carter as captain. Mrs G. Cook was elected President and Miss Mavis Rayner was made Captain. This happened because a ruling was made that no person can hold two positions. For many years the ladies held regular meetings and rode their motorcycles every time they could in hill climbs, trials and raced against themselves and the men.

By 1936 the club activities slowly decreased and they ceased to operate and closed. According to **Ross Hill**, who said his mother Jean Strang was pregnant at the time with him. He remembers his mother stating she wished to race against Mrs Fay Taylour, a dirt track star from England, but was refused permission by the authorities because of pregnancy.

Ross believes marriage and family commitments were the reasons for the club ceasing to exist.

When Ross learnt of my searching for information on the Ladies Motorcycle Club of South Australia, Ross rummaged through his late mother's belongings and found the club's badge and gave it to me for safekeeping.

<u>Motorcycles are classified as motor vehicles</u> and are therefore subject to the same general road rules as cars, trucks and other motor vehicles. Specific road laws apply to motorcycle riders. These are:

An approved helmet must always be worn.

Motorcycles built after **June 1975** must have two rear view mirrors to provide a clear view of the road behind

- .Only one pillion passenger may be carried and then only if the bike is fitted with proper footrests and seating
- Pillion passengers must always sit astride the seat facing forwards and with both feet on the footrests. Learner riders must not carry a passenger either as a pillion or in a side car. This includes a person acting

.Learner riders must not tow a trailer

as a Qualified Supervising Driver

- .Overtaking on the left of another vehicle in the same lane is illegal unless the other vehicle is turning right .Riders may ride two-abreast but no more than 1.5 metres apart
- .Both the rider and passenger are responsible for ensuring the passenger wears an approved helmet and appropriate protective clothing
- .A child under the age of eight years cannot be carried as a pillion passenger on a motorcycle. They may only be carried in a sidecar

.All sidecar passengers must be safely seated at all times that the motorcycle is moving

.An animal cannot be carried on the petrol tank of a motorcycle (except a farm animal carried for less than 500 metres).

Recommended equipment

Clothing of strong, brightly coloured material covering arms and legs is recommended. Leather gloves offer good protection for hands and enclosed, sturdy footwear protects feet. You should never ride in sandals, thongs or bare feet

Lane Filtering

Lane filtering is when a motor bike rider travels at low speed in between two lines of stationary or slow moving traffic travelling in the same direction.

Strict conditions apply to lane filtering: only permitted when safe to do so

- .only permitted at speeds of 30km/h or slower
- .only permitted by R and R-Date licensed motor bike riders. Learner's Permit holders, P1 Provisional licence holders and moped riders with a car licence only must not lane filter
- .not permitted in a school zone or across pedestrian and children's crossings
- .not permitted next to parked cars or between vehicles and the kerb, or on roundabouts
- .not permitted in bicycle, bus or tram lanes.

Being seen

The outline of a motorcycle is about one-third the size of a car, which makes it difficult for drivers to see them especially among other vehicles.

Remember that a motorcycle rider can see a car much better than a driver can see a motorcycle.

To improve your chances of being seen by other road users, it is recommended that you:

- .Wear bright coloured clothing
- .Ride with your headlight on at all times
- .Ride in a position on the road that provides maximum safety and visibility of your motorcycle to other road Users (especially not in the blind spots of other vehicles).

Equipment and clothing



When choosing equipment and clothing, bear in mind the purpose: VISIBILITY as well as PROTECTION.

Compulsory equipment

A motorcycle rider, any pillion passenger and any passenger in a side car must wear an approved safety helmet. An 'approved' helmet is a helmet manufactured, tested and marked in accordance with the requirements of the Australian Standard (AS 1698) or European Standard (ECE 22.05) as specified in the Road Traffic (Miscellaneous) Regulations 2014.

Further information about motorcyclist safety can be found in the Rider's Safety Handbook.

A white or brightly coloured helmet provides good visibility both by day and night. The helmet must be fit for purpose and in good condition and be a firm fit.

Over 3,500 attendees turned out to look at the many and varied examples of British engineering on display. The day was a family picnic displaying British motorcycles, cars, trucks, and tractors. Even British-powered wooden boats were on display, and, to top it off, there was a flyover by a De Havilland Tiger Moth aircraft.

There were over 720 entrants, including motorcycles. Our theme for 2025 was 1950," The Year of Change," when many pre-war designs gave way to new designs and technologies. Our 1950 display was well represented with Royal Enfields, BSA Bantams, and BSA C10s.





Our oldest motorcycle entered was a 1914 Douglas 2 ¾ hp, owned by Ian Hese. When asked about the history of the motorcycle, Ian said the previous owner purchased it at a country swap meet in the early 'nineties in "about three wheelbarrow loads". Our youngest motorcycle was a 1971 Norten Commando. Thank you, Ian and other enthusiasts, for bringing your motorcycles to All British Day 2025.

Awards were presented, and our local Veteran & Vintage Motorcycle Club of SA took out the Shannon's Best Motorcycle Club Display.

Local sporting and community groups provided a good selection of food and drink, and All British Day continues to donate to various local charity groups. Activities are offered free for children, and it is a great family day out, with some participants dressing in the same era as their vehicles.



August 17th 2025—Sunday Ride

Commence at 1000 am at the Feathers Hotel, Corner of Glynburn and Greenhill Roads.

The route takes us up Greenhill Rd and turns right at Range Road, Carey Gully. Then a left and left again into Gum Flat Rd. Then a very tight right-hand corner onto Beaumont Road which takes us to Verdun, from where we follow the Onkaparinga Valley Road to Balhannah.

Turning right at the main intersection in Balhannah we then cross over the railway line and turn right to follow the road to Hahndorf where we do a quick left right onto Pine Ave and on to Echunga.

From Echunga we veer left up Church Hill Rd and turn right onto the Mt. Barker - Flaxley rd.

We then veer left onto Stamps Rd to Macclesfield and then left onto Gemmel Rd which will take us to the Strathalbyn - Mt. Barker Rd. Turn left and head uphill to the Wistow Bakery for morning tea.

Leaving the Bakery, we turn right onto Paech Rd and shortly after, right onto Yunkunga Rd before veering left onto Harper Rd. At the end of the road, turn right onto Springs Rd and then left onto Summit Rd which takes us over the Freeway and pops out at Nairne.

Turn right onto the Old Princes Hwy and follow it out past Dawsley to the top of the hill and a left turn onto the kwood fantastic Harrogate Rd.

In the centre of Harrogate turn left and follow the bitumen down to Pfeiffer Rd and turn left.

Then another left past Inverbrackie and turn right onto Mappinga Rd. Back to the Onkaparinga Valley Rd and turn left to Oakbank.

There is a right turn at the beginning of Oakbank onto Oakwood Rd, over the ford and uphill to a T junction at Swamp Rd.

We turn left onto Swamp Rd and then a right turn onto the Balhannah -Greenhill Rd.

Follow your nose until we arrive back at the Feathers Hotel for coffee, lunch or departure.
